Republic Act 8540 – Philippine Merchant Officers Act of 1998  
 Memorandum No. 130 – Standard of Training Certification and Watch keeping (STCW) of 1978 as amended.

Presidential Decree No. 761 - Allowing Registration of Vessel's Ownership for Corporate or Association in the Philippines

Presidential Decree No. 866 – Reducing the Term of Lease or Charter. Not less than 1 year and Allowing Overseas Used in certain Cases.

Presidential Decree No. 890 – Penalizing the Unauthorized Salvage of Vessel and Other Hazards to Navigation as well as Cargoes Carried by Sunken Vessels
